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

- In December, you can embrace the spirit of warmth as the weather cools through Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's energetic 39th Symphony coupled with John Harbison's *Snow Country* featuring QCSO Principal Oboist, Andy Parker.

Save the date for the 007th year of QCSO's annual Soirée: Shaken, Not Stirred on October 21, where we will celebrate the QCSO's impact on our community and raise funds to sustain that impact. Plus, do not miss our QCSO @ the Movies programs this fall featuring Disney's Tim Burton's *The Nightmare Before Christmas* 

and Harry Potter and the Half-Blood Prince!

I invite you to visit our website at qcso.org for information about our many concerts, events, and educational programs. with community engagement, culminating in critically acclaimed performances of Britten's War Requiem in Europe and America, collaborating with German and American music students, professional musicians and the Nobel Peace Prize Forum. In 2016. he spearheaded the St. Matthew Passion project, again joining German and American students with study and performances on both sides of the Atlantic. Recent projects include appearances with the Joffrey Ballet, conducting Stravinsky's Rite of Spring, as part of a larger exploration of that work, commemorating its 100th anniversary. Formerly Music Director of the Richmond Symphony Orchestra, a position he held from 1999 to 2009, Smith was praised for his innovative and approachable programming and is widely credited with fostering the orchestra's unprecedented artistic growth. He returned to guest conduct the orchestra in 2019.

As a guest conductor, Smith enjoys a burgeoning international reputation that has already brought him engagements and re-engagements with prestigious American orchestras, including the St. Louis Symphony, the Houston Symphony and the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra. With the Minnesota Orchestra, he made his critically acclaimed Sommerfest debut in 2006 and made his subscription series debut in March of 2009, and returns regularly as a guest conductor. An active opera conductor, he has appeared with the Virginia Opera, leading Mozart's *The Magic Flute* to critical acclaim, among many others. Other recent appearances include

debut performances with the Orquesta Sinfonica de Costa Rica and the Spokane Symphony, and a return to Verizon Hall with the Curtis Orchestra in an all-Wagner program with Eric Owens and Heidi Melton. He regularly returns to his alma mater to lead the Symphony Orchestra of The Curtis Institute of Music, and led the orchestra on tour in China and Korea in the fall of 2011. Smith's debut at the Nomus Music Festival in Novi Sad, Serbia was met with critical and audience acclaim and led to immediate reengagement. Other recent and upcoming appearances include the Santa Barbara Symphony, Brazil's Orquestra Sinfôniea da USP, the Hartford Symphony, Orquesta Sinfonica de Xalapa, the Phoenix Symphony, the Colorado Symphony, the Eugene Symphony, the Curtis Opera Theatre, the Jacksonville Symphony, the Berkshire Choral Festival, the Eastern Music Festival, the Tulsa Philharmonic, Orchestra London (Ontario), and the European Center for Opera and Vocal Art in Ghent, Belgium.

A champion of the music of our time, Smith was the Director of New Music Projects for the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, and developed that orchestra's Engine 408 series, working closely with living composers and added his unique perspective to enhance that orchestra's great tradition of fostering new works. He again collaborated with YoYo Ma and members of the Chamber Music Society of Minnesota in Hún Qiáo (Bridge of Souls), a concert of remembrance and reconciliation featuring world premieres by Korean, Japanese, Chinese and

American composers. A firm believer in the use of technical innovation to reach world-wide audiences, he debuted in 2002 with the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, conducting the final round of the first Minnesota International Piano-e-Competition, where he led six concerto performances that were streamed live over the Internet. He has led the Minnesota Orchestra in the Competition's final round since 2004 and returns each summer.

Smith grew up in a musical family in Phoenix, Arizona where he began the serious study of conducting while still in his teens. He is a graduate in cello performance of the Juilliard School, where he studied with Claus Adam, and of the Curtis Institute of Music, where he studied conducting with Max Rudolf and Otto-Werner Mueller. While at Curtis, Smith was first prize winner in the National Repertory Orchestra Conductors Competition, and upon graduation, was named Assistant Conductor of the Opera Company of Philadelphia and the Philadelphia Singers. From 1989 to 1994, Smith served as Associate Conductor of the Phoenix Symphony Orchestra and from 1992 through 1999 served as Music Director of the Cheyenne Symphony Orchestra. His dynamic personality, creative programming, and focus on outreach helped revitalize the Springfield (MA) Symphony, where he served as Music Director from 1995 through 2000.

Smith resides in Minneapolis, where his wife, Ellen Dinwiddie Smith, is a horn player with the Minnesota Orchestra. They have two sons, Alexander and Noah.

# Musicians in the Schools

#### Symphony Day

Every year on Symphony Day, over 6,500 fourth and fifth grade students from across the Quad Cities region travel to Davenport's Adler Theatre to experience a live orchestra performance. This event introduces students to the symphony orchestra and classical music through an engaging 45 minutes program performed by the Quad City Symphony Orchestra. The program is carefully designed to enrich the elementary school general music experience and incorporates fourth and fifth-grade National Core Arts Standards. In advance of the Symphony Day performances, each partnering classroom music teacher is provided a Resource Guide to help familiarize their students with the music they will experience during the concert. This guide contains recordings of the repertoire, as well as information about the music, composers, orchestra, and experience. Additionally, it offers adaptable plans of classroom activities for use by general music teachers.

# **IMPACT** report








### season highlights

- Continued to broaden our community engagement by steadily increasing the number of individual Annual Fund donors year over year, topping more than 1,000 donors supporting our mission this season!
- A record amount of need-based financial assistance was awarded to students this season, with \$11,780 distributed to 39 Youth Ensemble students, \$44,905 to 59 Private Lesson Students, and \$13,310 to 9 Youth Ensemble Tour participants.
- Our presentation of Jake Heggie's chamber opera Two Remain (Out of Darkness), based on the true stories of two Holocaust survivors served as the catalyst for the community-wide project Out of Darkness: Holocaust Messages for Today coordinated by the Jewish Federation of the Quad Cities.
- 40 members of the Youth Symphony Orchestra and 32 chaperones and companions participated in the Inaugural International Youth Symphony Orchestra Touring Program, representing the Quad Cities through three performances and a student exchange in Germany and the Czech Republic.
- The QCSO received special recognition for Arts Learning from the Iowa Arts Council and recognition from the Illinois Council of Orchestras for the Community Relations of the Year for the launch of the Concert Access Pass (CAP) and Promotional Partnership Programs during the 2021-22 season.
- In two firsts, our annual Symphony Day programming featured the
  professional orchestra and utilized Carnegie Hall's Link Up Program,
  introducing 6,262 4th and 5th grade students across the Quad Cities
  Region to the symphony orchestra and classical music.





#### Cuban-American cellist Dr. Tommy Mesa has established himself as one of the most charismatic, innovative, and engaging performers of his generation. The recipient of the Sphinx Organization's 2023 Medal of Excellence, its highest honor, Mesa has appeared as soloist at the Supreme Court of the United States on four occasions and with major orchestras including the Los Angeles Philharmonic at the Hollywood Bowl, The Cleveland Orchestra, The Philadelphia Orchestra, and the symphony orchestras of Indianapolis, Madison, New Jersey, San Antonio, and Santa Barbara, among others. Mesa gave the world premiere and subsequent tour of Jessie Montgomery's cello concerto in the 2022-23 season, with performances at major halls across the United States and Brazil including Miami's New World Center and Carnegie Hall. His orchestral recording debut of the work was released in July 2023 on Deutsche Grammophon.

Orchestral highlights of the 2023-24 season include an extensive performance tour of Cuba and performance debuts with the Calgary and Fort Wayne Philharmonic Orchestras; the Ann Arbor, Bay Atlantic, Columbus, Greenwich, Gulf Coast, Knoxville, Quad City, Reading,

Waterbury Symphony Orchestras; and Boston's Pro Arte Chamber Orchestra. Mesa returns to the Indianapolis Symphony as cocurator and featured performer for their chamber music series this season, premieres a new work by composer Andrea Casarrubios to kick off the new season at Bargemusic in New York, and will be featured in solo recitals with pianist Ilya Yakushev throughout the country including Jamestown (Rhode Island), Laguna Woods, and Sarasota. Past performance features include recitals at The Academy of Arts and Letters, Bay Chamber Concerts, University of Miami's Signature Series, Columbia University, Flagler Museum, The Heifetz Institute, California Center for the Arts, Meadowmount School of Music, Strad for Lunch Series, International Beethoven Project, Perlman Music Program Alumni Recital, and major universities across the United States.

This season celebrates several new recording releases and subsequent tours, including albums with pianist Michelle Cann and with bandoneonist/ composer IP Jofre. In the spring of 2023, Mesa was featured in an exclusive artist showcase on NYC's classical station WOXR that included selections of his upcoming album of world-premiere recordings by Black and Latinx composers with Cann. He also has an album release scheduled with pianist Olga Kern in 2024 and with The Crossing Choir in 2025. Mesa's first solo album, Division of Memory on the PARMA Recordings label, received rave reviews such as in PianoMania, "Do not hold your breath for Yo-Yo Ma to record this repertoire, for the just-as-excellent Mesa has the field entirely to himself." Mesa was featured on the GRAMMYnominated album, "Bonhoeffer," with the multiple GRAMMY winning group, The Crossing Choir. He has appeared with them as soloist at The Metropolitan Museum of Art in NYC, Longwood Gardens, The Winter Garden, and the

Theological Seminary in NYC. Mesa and The Crossing Choir also collaborated on the U.S. premiere of "Astralis" for choir and solo cello by renowned composer Wolfgang Rihm and have more collaborations and premieres scheduled for future seasons.

As an ensemble musician, Mesa has been on tours with Orpheus Chamber Orchestra and is the principal cellist of Sphinx Virtuosi who play every year on tour at almost every major venue across the United States. He also collaborates with Jupiter Chamber Players and has toured with Itzhak Perlman both nationally and internationally.

Mesa has given masterclasses at institutions such as U.C Berkeley, Boston Conservatory, the Colburn School, DePaul University, Meadowmount School of Music, University of Miami, University of Nevada-Las Vegas, Northwestern University, and Walnut Hill School. Previously, he held faculty positions at SUNY Purchase, Sphinx Performance Academy, The Heifetz Institute's PEG Program, Music Mountain Festival and School, Brooklyn Conservatory of Music, Montecito International Music Festival, St. Petersburg International Music Academy, and The Mozart Academy at John Jay College in New York City.

Mesa's career launched following after becoming the First Prize winner in the 2016 Sphinx Competition and a winner of the 2017 Astral Artists National Auditions. He received his BM from The Juilliard School, MM from Northwestern University, and his DMA from the Manhattan School of Music. His principal teachers were Timothy Eddy, Julia Lichten, Hans Jorgen Jensen, Mark Churchill, Ross Harbaugh, and Wells Cunningham. Mesa performs on a Nicolò Gagliano cello made in 1767 and a bow by Andre Richaume, both generously loaned to him by CANIMEX INC in Drummondville, Canada.




Greg Zelek, organ

Praised as "extraordinary in the classical music world" (Jon Hornbacher, PBS Wisconsin Life) and a "musical star" (Bill Wineke, Channel 3000),

Greg Zelek is the Principal Organist of the Madison Symphony Orchestra and Curator of the Overture Concert Organ, where he regularly performs and oversees all of the MSO's organ programming. Since September 2017, Greg has proudly held the Elaine and Nicholas Mischler Curatorship.

In addition to concertizing throughout the United States, Greg performs with orchestras as both a soloist and ensemble member, including the MET Orchestra, Jacksonville Symphony, Florida Orchestra, New World Symphony, Ridgewood Symphony, Miami Symphony, and Madison Symphony. Highlights of the upcoming 2023-24 season include return appearances as the Artistin-Residence of the Organ Series of the Jacksonville Symphony, concerts as the Visiting Guest Artist at St. John's University, performances with cellist Thomas Mesa and also with trombonist Mark Hetzler, as well as solo concerts throughout the country. With the Madison Symphony, Greg will perform in two of the four concerts that he curates, including a unique bilingual performance with a Latin-American Band, and a closing concert with the UW-Madison Wind Ensemble. Greg also released his first recording on the Overture Concert Organ in the Fall of 2022.

In 2016, Greg was chosen by The Diapason magazine as one of the top "20 Under 30" organists, a feature which selects the most successful young artists in the field. He was the First Prize winner in the 2012 Rodgers North American Classical Organ Competition, 2012 West Chester University Organ Competition, and 2010 East Carolina University Organ Competition, as well as the Audience Prize winner of the 2016 Longwood Gardens International Organ Competition. A recipient of the inaugural Kovner Fellowship, he received his Bachelor's and Master's degrees, as well as an Artist Diploma, from the Juilliard School as a student of Paul Jacobs. Greg, who is Cuban-American and a native Spanish speaker, grew up in Miami, FL.



She made her debut with The Philadelphia Orchestra in 2021 and has recently performed concertos with The Cleveland Orchestra, the National Symphony Orchestra, the Orquestra Sinfônica Municipal de São Paulo, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, and the symphony orchestras of Atlanta, Baltimore, and Cincinnati.

Highlights of Cann's 2023-24 season include appearances with the Charlotte, Hawaii, Indianapolis, Québec, Sarasota, and Winnipeg symphony orchestras, and recitals in New York City, Portland, Berkeley, Beverly Hills, and Denver. She also has teaching and performance residencies at the University of Indiana South Bend and Meany Center for the

Performing Arts at the University of Washington.

Recognized as a leading interpreter of the piano music of Florence Price, Cann performed the New York City premiere of Price's Piano Concerto in One Movement with The Dream Unfinished Orchestra in July 2016 and the Philadelphia premiere with The Philadelphia Orchestra and Music Director Yannick Nézet-Séguin in February 2021. Her recording of the concerto with the New York Youth Symphony won a Grammy Award in 2023 for Best Orchestral Performance. Her acclaimed debut solo album Revival, featuring music by Price and Margaret Bonds, was released in May 2023 on the Curtis Studio label. She has also recorded two Price piano quintets with the Catalyst Quartet.

Cann was the recipient of the 2022 Sphinx Medal of Excellence, the highest honor bestowed by the Sphinx Organization. She also received the Cleveland Institute of Music's 2022 Alumni Achievement Award and the 2022 Andrew Wolf Chamber Music Award.

A celebrated chamber musician, Cann has collaborated with leading artists including the Catalyst, Dover, and Juilliard string quartets, violinists Timothy and Nikki Chooi, and cellist Thomas Mesa. She has appeared as co-host and collaborative pianist with NPR's From The Top, collaborating with actor/conductor Damon Gupton, violinist Leila Josefowicz, and violinist and MacArthur Fellow Vijay Gupta. Cann's numerous media appearances include PBS Great Performances' Now Hear This hosted by Scott Yoo and Living the Classical Life with host Zsolt Bognár.

Embracing a dual role as performer and pedagogue, Cann is frequently invited to teach master classes, give lecture-demonstrations, and lead teaching residencies. Recent residencies include the Gilmore International Keyboard Festival and the National Conference of the Music Teachers National Association. She has recorded lessons for tonebase, the popular piano lesson platform. She has also served on the juries of the Cleveland International Piano Competition, the Kauffman Music Center International Youth Piano Competition, and the piano competition of the Music Academy of the West.

A staunch believer in community-building through music, Cann has served as the director of two children's choruses in the El Sistema-inspired program Play On Philly and was part of the inaugural class of ArtistYear fellows at the Curtis Institute of Music. Through ArtistYear, she worked with community partners City Year, Teach for America, and AmeriCorps to provide arts education and access to underserved communities in Philadelphia.

Cann holds bachelor's and master's degrees in piano performance from the Cleveland Institute of Music, where she studied with Paul Schenly and Dr. Daniel Shapiro, and an Artist's Diploma from the Curtis Institute of Music, where she studied with Robert McDonald. She joined the Curtis piano faculty in 2020 as the inaugural Eleanor Sokoloff Chair in Piano Studies. She joined the piano faculty of the Manhattan School of Music in 2023.


as an adjudicator for the National Youth Orchestra, hosted by Carnegie Hall and the Gillet-Fox International Oboe Competition.

Andrew is currently the principal oboe of the Quad City Symphony Orchestra.

In addition to his collegiate teaching and performing experience, Andrew has also taught and coached chamber music at various international music festivals, including the Round Top Music Festival, Music in the Mountains, Oboe Fest in San Juan, FEMUSC festival in Brazil, the Hartwick Festival in New York, and the Kinhaven Music School in Vermont.

Andrew's solo album, The Singing Oboe, was released under the MSR Records label in 2014. The album was featured as CD of the week on the Boston station 99.5 WCRB. He recently released an album entitled *Portraits in Music* which features works for oboe, bassoon, and piano. He has also released an album of Handel trio sonatas with Nancy Ambrose King called *Handel: The "Halle" Sonatas, HWV 380-385.*

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## THE NATIONAL ANTHEM

While several compositions have the honor of appearing multiple times on more than 100 years of playbills, one piece has the distinction of being performed more often than any other, The Star-Spangled Banner. General Manager Elsie Von Maur instituted the custom of placing it at the beginning of every program immediately after the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941, which coincided with a Sunday performance date. Those in attendance rose to sing the lyrics in patriotic fervor. It immediately became a fixture at all future concerts, accompanied by audience participation with every crisp rendition.

The custom remains today, but it endured a memorable community controversy. It was removed from one

concert in November, 1990. Vocal and written objections from some patrons and members of the public were swift and stinging. The negative reaction was enough to outweigh considerations that the national anthem was distracting to the music and uncomfortable for senior patrons due to the standing factor. While opinions were judged to be about 50-50 on the issue, the intensity of the voices to return to tradition ruled the day. The Star-Spangled Banner resumed its place on the program for the December concert, where it continues to wave over the land of the free and the home of the brave.



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

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
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
