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



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

with community engagement, culminating in critically acclaimed performances of Britten's War Requiem in Europe and America, collaborating with German and American music students, professional musicians and the Nobel Peace Prize Forum. In 2016. he spearheaded the St. Matthew Passion project, again joining German and American students with study and performances on both sides of the Atlantic. Recent projects include appearances with the Joffrey Ballet, conducting Stravinsky's Rite of Spring, as part of a larger exploration of that work, commemorating its 100th anniversary. Formerly Music Director of the Richmond Symphony Orchestra, a position he held from 1999 to 2009, Smith was praised for his innovative and approachable programming and is widely credited with fostering the orchestra's unprecedented artistic growth. He returned to guest conduct the orchestra in 2019.

As a guest conductor, Smith enjoys a burgeoning international reputation that has already brought him engagements and re-engagements with prestigious American orchestras, including the St. Louis Symphony, the Houston Symphony and the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra. With the Minnesota Orchestra, he made his critically acclaimed Sommerfest debut in 2006 and made his subscription series debut in March of 2009, and returns regularly as a guest conductor. An active opera conductor, he has appeared with the Virginia Opera, leading Mozart's The Magic Flute to critical acclaim, among many others. Other recent appearances include

debut performances with the Orquesta Sinfonica de Costa Rica and the Spokane Symphony, and a return to Verizon Hall with the Curtis Orchestra in an all-Wagner program with Eric Owens and Heidi Melton. He regularly returns to his alma mater to lead the Symphony Orchestra of The Curtis Institute of Music, and led the orchestra on tour in China and Korea in the fall of 2011. Smith's debut at the Nomus Music Festival in Novi Sad, Serbia was met with critical and audience acclaim and led to immediate reengagement. Other recent and upcoming appearances include the Santa Barbara Symphony, Brazil's Orquestra Sinfôniea da USP, the Hartford Symphony, Orquesta Sinfonica de Xalapa, the Phoenix Symphony, the Colorado Symphony, the Eugene Symphony, the Curtis Opera Theatre, the Jacksonville Symphony, the Berkshire Choral Festival, the Eastern Music Festival, the Tulsa Philharmonic, Orchestra London (Ontario), and the European Center for Opera and Vocal Art in Ghent, Belgium.

A champion of the music of our time, Smith was the Director of New Music Projects for the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, and developed that orchestra's Engine 408 series, working closely with living composers and added his unique perspective to enhance that orchestra's great tradition of fostering new works. He again collaborated with YoYo Ma and members of the Chamber Music Society of Minnesota in Hún Qiáo (Bridge of Souls), a concert of remembrance and reconciliation featuring world premieres by Korean, Japanese, Chinese and

American composers. A firm believer in the use of technical innovation to reach world-wide audiences, he debuted in 2002 with the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, conducting the final round of the first Minnesota International Piano-e-Competition, where he led six concerto performances that were streamed live over the Internet. He has led the Minnesota Orchestra in the Competition's final round since 2004 and returns each summer.

Smith grew up in a musical family in Phoenix, Arizona where he began the serious study of conducting while still in his teens. He is a graduate in cello performance of the Juilliard School, where he studied with Claus Adam, and of the Curtis Institute of Music, where he studied conducting with Max Rudolf and Otto-Werner Mueller. While at Curtis, Smith was first prize winner in the National Repertory Orchestra Conductors Competition, and upon graduation, was named Assistant Conductor of the Opera Company of Philadelphia and the Philadelphia Singers, From 1989 to 1994, Smith served as Associate Conductor of the Phoenix Symphony Orchestra and from 1992 through 1999 served as Music Director of the Cheyenne Symphony Orchestra. His dynamic personality, creative programming, and focus on outreach helped revitalize the Springfield (MA) Symphony, where he served as Music Director from 1995 through 2000.

Smith resides in Minneapolis, where his wife, Ellen Dinwiddie Smith, is a horn player with the Minnesota Orchestra. They have two sons, Alexander and Noah.

#### **Group Lesson Program**

The QCSO collaborates with three community partners to provide after school violin and cello group lessons to area students with access to free instruments and quality instruction. #### Symphony Day

Every year on Symphony Day, over 6,500 fourth and fifth grade students from across the Quad Cities region travel to Davenport's Adler Theatre to experience a live orchestra performance. This event introduces students to the symphony orchestra and classical music through an engaging 45 minutes program performed by the Quad City Symphony Orchestra. The program is carefully designed to enrich the elementary school general music experience and incorporates fourth and fifth-grade National Core Arts Standards. In advance of the Symphony Day performances, each partnering classroom music teacher is provided a Resource Guide to help familiarize their students with the music they will experience during the concert. This guide contains recordings of the repertoire, as well as information about the music, composers, orchestra, and experience. Additionally, it offers adaptable plans of classroom activities for use by general music teachers.

# **IMPACT** report








## season highlights

- Continued to broaden our community engagement by steadily increasing the number of individual Annual Fund donors year over year, topping more than 1,000 donors supporting our mission this season!
- A record amount of need-based financial assistance was awarded to students this season, with \$11,780 distributed to 39 Youth Ensemble students, \$44,905 to 59 Private Lesson Students, and \$13,310 to 9 Youth Ensemble Tour participants.
- Our presentation of Jake Heggie's chamber opera Two Remain (Out of Darkness), based on the true stories of two Holocaust survivors served as the catalyst for the community-wide project Out of Darkness: Holocaust Messages for Today coordinated by the Jewish Federation of the Quad Cities.
- 40 members of the Youth Symphony Orchestra and 32 chaperones and companions participated in the Inaugural International Youth Symphony Orchestra Touring Program, representing the Quad Cities through three performances and a student exchange in Germany and the Czech Republic.
- The QCSO received special recognition for Arts Learning from the Iowa Arts Council and recognition from the Illinois Council of Orchestras for the Community Relations of the Year for the launch of the Concert Access Pass (CAP) and Promotional Partnership Programs during the 2021-22 season.
- In two firsts, our annual Symphony Day programming featured the professional orchestra and utilized Carnegie Hall's Link Up Program, introducing 6,262 4th and 5th grade students across the Quad Cities Region to the symphony orchestra and classical music.








She received her BM in violin performance from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign while studying with Simin Ganatra. Nash has participated in master classes with the Silk Road Ensemble, the

Growing up, Emily spent her summers attending Interlochen Arts Camp, California Summer Music, and Madeline Island. In 2005 she was a solo competition winner of the New Haven Youth Symphony Orchestra, first prize winner of the Greenwich Center for Chamber Music Competition, a guest soloist with the Choate rosemary Hall's tour to Italy, and a finalist in the Greater Bridgeport Solo Competition.

She was awarded the Farwell Award from the Musicians Club of Women Scholarship Competition in 2011. Emily was the Civic Orchestra of Chicago's Concertmaster from 2012-2013. Yo-Yo Ma asked her to return in 2014 to be a mentor for

the Artistic Challenge Project. Emily has given solo recitals for the Orvieto Chamber Music Concert Series, the Musician Club of Women, the Fourth Presbyterian Church, and the Fran Randall Memorial Recital Series.

This is Nash's eighth season with the Quad City Symphony Orchestra, where she serves as Associate Concertmaster, and her first season with the Chicago Sinfonietta Orchestra. Emily also subs with the Milwaukee Symphony, Milwaukee Ballet, Hawaii Symphony, Chicago Philharmonic, Fort Wayne Philharmonic, Illinois Philharmonic, Lake Forest Symphony, and the Midwest Mozart Festival. Along with performing, Emily maintains a small private violin studio and has been an adjunct faculty member of the Vandercook College of Music. Emily resides in a Chicago suburb with her five-year-old daughter Natalie and husband and violist, Bruno Vaz da Silva.

# Sabrina Tabby, violin

Violinist Sabrina Tabby, from Philadelphia, developed a fondness for music-making at a very young age, playing daily with her twin sister (the cellist of ATLYS!). The two were featured on National Public Radio's "From the Top" radio series and television show at Carnegie Hall and placed repeatedly in the Fischoff International Chamber music Competition. Sabrina has performed across four continents, as concertmaster and soloist, in chamber groups, as well as in various baroque and new music ensembles. A founding member (2010) of the NYC-based new music ensemble, Contemporaneous, she is prominently featured on Innova Recordings album Stream of Stars: Music of Dylan Mattingly and led the ensemble, in May 2023, in their Walt Disney Hall Debut of the 6-hour opera, Stranger Love.

Sabrina actively travels to perform music of all styles, often with her husband, conductor and violist Ernesto Estigarribia. Recent highlights include a tour through Central Europe soloing with the Quad City Youth Symphony Orchestra in performances of Michael Kropf's violin concerto, commissioned for her. Sabrina has also been a proud member of the violin section of the Quad City Symphony Orchestra's since 2018 and was recently appointed as the new concertmaster of the Mankato Symphony Orchestra.

Since 2020, she has recorded hundreds of remote sessions spanning albums to motion pictures. Her solo performance is prominently featured in the opening credits of award-winning documentary 'Buried: The 1982 Alpine Meadows Avalanche' by Julian Scherle. In Nashville, she is a sought-



after session musician in the bustling recording industry there.

When not performing, recording, practicing, or teaching, Sabrina's favorite activity is teaming up with Ernesto in the kitchen to concoct (and devour) delicious plant-based creations!



Bruno Silva began studying viola in 2004 in his native Brazil at the Escola de Musica de Brasilia. After one year, he placed in a solo competition and had the opportunity to perform with the Orquestra Sinfonica da Escola de

Musica de Brasilia, performing the G Major Viola Concerto by Telemann. He graduated from the conservatory in two and a half years, a program which normally takes eight years, and then enrolled in the University of Brasilia.

Bruno has gained much experience as an orchestral and chamber musician. He has worked with the Lyric Opera of Chicago, Hawaii Symphony Orchestra, Civic Orchestra of Chicago, Chicago Sinfonietta, Quad City Symphony Orchestra, Elgin Symphony Orchestra, among others. With the Civic Orchestra of Chicago, he had the opportunity of working with Yo-Yo Ma. Bruno was a founding member of the YOURS (Youth

Orchestra Urban Rita Simon) Project Chicago, which is an El Sistema music program for unprivileged students, where he worked until 2012. Bruno Completed his undergraduate in music performance at North Park University where he studied with Charles Pikler, Chicago Symphony principal viola and his MM at DePaul University, studying with Rami Solomonow, Lyric Opera of Chicago former viola principal. Bruno has judged many competitions such as solo and ensemble and ILMEA. Today, Bruno is a freelancer in the Chicago area performing concerts with several orchestras, teaching private lessons, writing arrangements, and performing with the Cloud Gate String Quartet for weddings and events.







# Hannah Holman, cello

Hannah Holman, cellist, joined the New York City Ballet Orchestra at the beginning of the 2012-2013 season. Her career has encompassed orchestral and chamber music, solo performances, and teaching. In a review of the second CD she recorded with pianist Réne Lecuona, *Fanfare magazine* declares "her tone and technique are the stuff that cello legends are made of ... Holman's cello sings with a lustrous tone that's hard to resist."

In addition to her work with the New York City Ballet Orchestra, Ms. Holman is the principal cellist of the Quad City Symphony, a position she has held since 2008. She began her professional career in England playing with the English String Orchestra under Yehudi Menuhin and the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra under Simon Rattle. Her previous orchestral work also includes serving as assistant principal cello with the Michigan Chamber Orchestra, the Richmond Symphony; and the American Sinfonietta.

Hannah is fortunate to have a diverse career allowing much time for solo work. She is currently in postproduction of CD #3 with Réne Lecuona featuring cello sonatas by woman composers

from the past and this summer got to perform Jerome Robbin's Suite of Dances on stage as part of the NYCB Move's tour to the Vail Dance Festival. In 2019, Hannah performed the Korngold Cello Concerto with the Quad City Symphony Orchestra, Jennifer Higdon's Soliguoy also with the QCSO, and with the Solomon Chamber Orchestra. She is in the middle of a video project highlighting the lives of women cellists from the past, and performed six pieces with the Iowa City Community Chamber Orchestra, each piece focusing on a different cellist. She performed the 4th Cello Suite of J.S. Bach in Carnegie Hall on March 3, 2020 as part of the Bach Cello Suite Festival, celebrating 300 years of the cello suites.

An active chamber musician, Ms
Holman helped found Trio 826, with
her dear friends Susanna Klein, violin,
and Julia Bullard, viola. She was a
founding member of the Beaumont
Piano Trio, which performed around
the United States and England, and
was also a founding member of
Quadrivinium, a music ensemble in
residence at the Virginia Museum
of Fine Arts. From 2002-2011, she
was a member of the Maia Quartet,
the University of lowa's quartet

in residence, which toured China, Japan, and throughout the United States, including teaching residencies at Interlochen Center for the Arts, the Great Wall International Music Academy in China, and the Austin Chamber Music Center. She regularly performs in chamber ensembles with musicians from throughout the United States.

A dedicated private teacher who finds great fulfillment in helping students of all ages grow musically, Ms. Holman was on the University of Iowa music faculty from 2002-2012, and most recently was on the faculties of the University of Northern Iowa and Biola Conservatory. She has also served on the faculties of the Worcester College (UK), Michigan State University Community School, and Virginia Union University. She has participated in numerous festivals, and has been on the faculty of the Eastern Music Festival since 2001 and currently serves on the faculty of the International Cello Institute, the Five Seasons Music Festival, and Taconic Music. Hannah is the founder and Artistic Director of a new music school based in the Quad Cities, The Deanery School of Music.

Ms. Holman studied at the Eastman School of Music and Michigan State University, where she completed her Bachelor of Music degree. She obtained her Master of Music Degree with Fritz Magg at the New England Conservatory. Hannah was fortunate enough to have several lessons with William Pleeth in London as postgraduate study. Her musical education began at age 5 with her grandmother, whose 1925 Becker cello she plays today. She is eternally grateful for the fine teaching of a transformative teacher, Louis Potter, during her junior high and high school years.



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# Marian Lee, piano

Marian Lee made her New York
City debut at Carnegie Hall's Weill
Recital Hall as winner of the Artists
International Award and has appeared
as soloist and with orchestra in Chile,
Norway, Russia, Thailand, Belgium,
Poland, Italy, Azerbaijan, France,
Turkmenistan, Brazil, Byelorussia,
Hong Kong, Estonia, Austria, as well as
in prestigious venues such as NYC's
Lincoln Center, the Kennedy Center's
Millennium Stage, Seattle's Benaroya
Hall, Moscow's Tchaikovsky Hall and

Rachmaninoff Hall, and the Hermitage Winter Palace in St. Petersburg, Russia. In liaison with the U.S. State Department, Lee also received numerous grants in support of performances abroad and is a former Fulbright and International Research and Exchange (IREX) scholar.

Recent local professional activities include performing the Bach F minor Concerto with the Quad City Symphony, Beethoven Concerto #3 with Clinton Symphony and

Tchaikovsky Concerto #1 with Muscatine Symphony Orchestra. Marian has performed regularly with OCSO concertmaster Naha Greenholtz on QCSO/WVIK's Up Close series (formerly known as the Signature series), and has performed with Philadelphia Orchestra concertmaster David Kim, and former concertmaster of Milwaukee Symphony, Frank Almond. She has also held master classes in Hong Kong, Delaware, Louisiana, Alabama, Illinois and Iowa and has the distinct honor of being the first female solo pianist to perform on Iowa Public Radio's Steinway Café, which is available to watch on YouTube. In addition, Marian's piano tutorial,"The Five Basic Motions of Piano Technique," has reached over half a million views on YouTube and is still climbing.

Marian Lee is a graduate of The Juilliard School (BM, MM), the Moscow Conservatory (post-grad) and the Peabody Institute of Music at Johns Hopkins University (DMA). Dr. Lee is currently a full professor in piano at St. Ambrose University and serves as head of the keyboard area. Lee previously taught at the University of Delaware before moving to the Quad Cities 12 years ago and has taught at the University of Iowa as a sabbatical replacement for Dr. Ksenia Nosikova. In 2017, Dr. Lee founded and has since served as the Director of St. Ambrose University's Summer Piano Camp, attracting 9-12th grade pianists from all over Eastern Iowa and Western Illinois. Marian is a proud and active member of local piano teacher organizations QCMTA and FMTA, as well as IMTA, MTNA and NFMC. Lee also serves as chair of the QC's historic Plevel Double Grand restoration committee, a rare Siamese-twin-like piano (only seven in the Western Hemisphere exist in working condition) that resides at Asbury UM church in Bettendorf, and cochairs a QC Piano Ensemble Festival that annually celebrates this rare piano with local student ensemble performances.

# José Francisco Salgado, videographer

José Francisco Salgado is an Emmynominated astronomer (BS in Physics, Univ. of Puerto Rico; PhD in Astronomy, Univ. of Michigan), experimental photographer, visual artist, and public speaker who creates multimedia works that communicate science in engaging ways. As the Executive Director and cofounder of KV 265, a non-profit science and arts education organization, Dr. Salgado collaborates with orchestras, composers, and musicians to present films that provoke curiosity and a sense of wonder about the Earth and the Universe.

His Science & Symphony films have been presented in 260 concerts and 215 lectures reaching a combined audience of more than 480,000 people in 21 countries. Orchestras that have presented these works include the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Boston Pops, the San Francisco Symphony, New World Symphony, and the Orchestra Teatro Regio Torino. His first two films were named by the International Astronomical Union and UNESCO as Special Projects for the International Year of Astronomy (IYA2009). In 2012

his film "Gustav Holst's The Planets" was chosen for Ravinia Festival's One Score, One Chicago initiative. In 2014, his collaboration with composer Christopher Theofanidis, "The Legend of the Northern Lights" was premiered with Grant Park Orchestra to critical acclaim in front of 32,000 people. In 2016, his short film "Carol of the Lights" was commissioned by Keith Lockhart and Boston Pops and presented 33 times to almost 75,000 people.

From 2006 until 2008 Salgado hosted "Nuestra Galaxia", a weekly astronomy news segment on Univision Chicago (WGBO) for which he received an Emmy nomination. From 2010 until 2012 Dr. Salgado produced and presented short science films with musician/composer Tom Bailey (formerly of British pop group Thompson Twins) as part of the audiovisual ensemble Bailey-Salgado Project.

As an experimental photographer, Salgado has visited more than 30 scientific sites in remote places including the Atacama desert, the French Pyrenees, and the South African Karoo, and has contributed visuals to documentaries produced for the History, Discovery, BBC, and National Geographic channels. He is also a contributing writer for Digital Photography Review (DPReview. com). As a public speaker, he has given lectures in all seven continents, including a presentation at the Amundsen-Scott South Pole Station.

# Sarah Shafer, soprano

Praised by the Philadelphia Inquirer for her "crystalline sound, perfectly true intonation, glowing warmth, and total presence" and by Opera News as "remarkable, artistically mature... a singer to watch," American soprano Sarah Shafer actively appears on the leading operatic and concert stages of the world.

In the 2023-2024 season, Ms. Shafer joins Pacific Opera Victoria as Nuria in *Ainadamar* and returns to the Spoleto Festival USA for the premiere of *Ruinous Gods* by Layale Chaker and Lisa Schlesinger. She recently appeared with the Florida Orchestra and Symphoria for Handel's *Messiah*. In the 2022-2023 season, she sang with the Quad City Symphony Orchestra as Krystyna in Heggie's *Two Remain* (Out of

Darkness) and Kalamazoo Symphony for the *Brahms Requiem*.

In the 2021-2022 season, Ms. Shafer joined the Philadelphia Chamber Music Society for a performance of Bach's *Cantata No. 51* and other selections. She returned to Opera Philadelphia, first in a program entitled "Larry Brownlee and Friends" and then for a concert of arias hosted at the Mann Center. She also appeared with frequent collaborator Opera Lafayette as Jeanette in Philidor's *Le maréchal ferrant* and presented a virtual recital for Friends of Chamber Music Portland (Oregon).

In recent seasons, she made her Metropolitan Opera debut as Azema in *Semiramide*, returned to Opera

Philadelphia as Iris in Semele, and sang Susanna in Le nozze di Figaro at San Diego Opera. Concert highlights have included Mozart's Requiem with the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra, Handel's Messiah with the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra, Haydn's Lord Nelson Mass with the Omaha Symphony, Schumann's Das Paradies und die Peri with the Cincinnati Symphony, and a series of concerts entitled "Emerging Voices" with the Philadelphia Chamber Music Society. She also presented Wolf's Mörike Lieder in recital with pianist Martin Katz, through a collaboration with the University Musical Society at the University of Michigan.

An avid recitalist and chamber musician, Ms. Shafer has enjoyed an active collaboration with legendary pianist Richard Goode, having performed Schumann and Brahms lieder with him at Carnegie Hall, Spivey Hall, Chamber Music Sedona, and Chamber Music Society of Detroit as well as other venues in Palm Beach and New York. She has performed Schubert's Der Hirt auf dem Felsen with clarinetist Anthony McGill at the Philadelphia Chamber Music Society, Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival, and Five Borough Music Festival. She has also collaborated with such musicians as guitarist Jason Vieaux, Anna Polonsky, and clarinetist Richard Stoltzman, Ms. Shafer was a resident artist at the Marlboro Music Festival for five summers, where she worked with Richard Goode, Mitsuko Uchida, Benita Valente, Sir Thomas Allen, and Martin Isepp. She actively appears with the Collaborative Arts Institute of Chicago, Philadelphia Chamber Music Society, Mozart and Handel Académie in Aix-en-Provence, Bard Summer Music Festival, and Liszt Academy in Budapest, Hungary.

A native of State College, PA, Ms. Shafer holds degrees in voice and opera from the Curtis Institute of Music, and is currently based outside Philadelphia.



Nathaniel Sullivan is a musician, theatre artist, and writer devoted to holding space for reflection, understanding, and creative projects that champion change. An "alert and highly musical baritone" (Opera News), Sullivan infuses his work with "impressive strength and precision" (Schmopera), as well as "great eloquence" (ConcertoNet) and "allegiance to both music and words" (ConcertoNet). With a particular devotion to the operatic repertoire of the 21st Century, Sullivan has performed the roles of the King in the North American premiere of George Benjamin's Lessons in Love and Violence, Harvey Milk in the world premiere of Stewart Wallace's Harvey Milk Reimagined (covered), Hannah-Younger in Kaminsky/Campbell/ Reed's As One, and Manfred in Jake Heggie's Two Remain. He was a Vocal Fellow at the Tanglewood Music Center in 2018 and 2019, a Gerdine Young Artist at Opera Theatre of Saint Louis in 2022, and a Vocal Fellow at the Ravinia Steans Music Institute in 2023.

# Nathaniel Sullivan, baritone


In addition to music theatre, Sullivan engages in many oratorio and concert performances around the country. He made his Carnegie Hall solo debut in 2018, performing Gerald Finzi's Requiem da Camera "with great eloquence" (ConcertoNet) alongside the NY Choral Society. Sullivan has joined the Blanche Moyse Chorale & Memorial Orchestra in performances of J.S. Bach's Mass in B Minor—bringing "natural expressiveness and warmth" to the "Et in Spiritum Sanctum" (Rutland Herald)—as well as numerous concerts featuring the cantatas of Bach—singing with a "warm lyricism" and "expressive presence" (Rutland Herald). Other orchestral highlights include Frank Martin's Sechs Monologe aus Jedermann with The Orchestra Now and HK Gruber's Frankenstein!! with Maestro James Bagwell. For this performance, Sullivan was regarded as "ebullient" and "a marvelous actor" (ConcertoNet), putting on "a virtuoso show in the part" (The Berkshire Eagle). Sullivan is a regular member of the Cleveland-based Baroque ensemble Apollo's Fire (led by Jeannette Sorrell) as well as the NYC-based ensemble Musica Sacra (led by Kent Tritle).

Sullivan also takes great interest in the art song and chamber repertoires, with a particular focus on recently composed works. Alongside the acclaimed Momenta Quartet, he premiered Matthew Greenbaum's Crossing Brooklyn Ferry in 2019 as part of Momenta's 15-year anniversary festival. Other chamber premieres include Oliver Leith's *Dream Horse* with conductor Thomas Adès; Gary Fagin's Jumping Mouse with the Knickerbocker Chamber Orchestra; two works by Joshua Groffman and Lawrence Kramer with the ensemble Contemporaneous at Carnegie Hall; and Songs of the Earth with members of the Albany Symphony. Sullivan's initial foray into the chamber

repertoire was a 2016 performance of Milton Babbitt's *Two Sonnets* for baritone, clarinet, viola, and cello.

Sullivan was one of seven winners of the 2023 Astral Artists National Competition and is currently on the Astral Artists roster. Further awards and recognitions include the Grace B. Jackson Prize for exceptional service at the Tanglewood Music Center (2019); the Louis Potter Award for Third Place in the Washington International Competition (2023); the Cynthia Vernardakis Award for Third Place in the Orpheus Vocal Competition (2019); the Janet Plucknett Award for Third Place in the Lyndon Woodside Oratorio Solo Competition (2019); First Place in the NATS National Musical Theatre Auditions (2018); and two artist scholarships from the Nebraska District of the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions (2012, 2013). He was also an Artist Division Finalist of the National Opera Association Vocal Competition (2023) and of the Opera Birmingham Vocal Competition (2023). During the COVID-19 pandemic, Sullivan conceived and self-produced the Pandemigram Project, raising over \$7,500 for 43 different charitable organizations. He received his BM from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, where he graduated in 2014 as a Chancellor's Scholar, and his MM in 2017 from the Bard College Conservatory of Music's Graduate Vocal Arts Program, led by Dawn Upshaw. He is currently based in New York City.

He is also Co-director of Music for Augustana Campus Ministries and is the Conductor and Artistic Director of Augustana Choral Artists. Before coming to Rock Island he was Director of Choral Activities at Concordia University in Irvine, California.

Active as a guest conductor and clinician throughout the United States and abroad, he has served in this capacity in All State, State, and Regional festivals of the American Choral Directors Association, the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians, National Association for Music Education, and many colleges and high schools. He has guest conducted the Tian Kong Choir and served as Guest Professor at Huazhong Normal University in

Wuhan, China. He has conducted his choirs in concerts throughout the United States as well as Austria, China, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Korea, Norway, Spain, and Sweden. He has done significant work on free improvisation with choirs and has published an Apple iBook on the subject.

He completed his undergraduate degree in Vocal Performance at Bethany College in Lindsborg, Kansas, his master's degree in Choral Conducting from California State University, Northridge, and his doctorate in Choral Conducting and Literature from the University of Illinois. He has studied conducting with John Alexander, Don Moses, Chet Alwes and Ann Howard Jones.

# Ricardo Morales, clarinet

A native of San Juan, Puerto Rico, Mr. Morales began his studies at the Escuela Libre de Musica along with his five siblings, who are all distinguished musicians. He continued his studies at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music and Indiana University, where he received his Artist Diploma.

Mr. Morales has been a featured soloist with many orchestras, including the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra, the Chicago Symphony, the Cincinnati Symphony, the Indianapolis Symphony, the Seoul Philharmonic, and the Flemish Radio Symphony. During his tenure with

the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra, he soloed in Carnegie Hall and on two European tours. He made his solo debut with The Philadelphia Orchestra in 2004 and has since performed as soloist on numerous occasions. Ricardo performed the world premiere of the Clarinet Concerto by Jonathan Leshnoff, commissioned for him by the Philadelphia Orchestra.

An active chamber musician, Mr.
Morales has performed in the MET
Chamber Ensemble series at Carnegie
Hall's Weill Recital Hall, at the Santa
Fe Chamber Music Festival, the
Philadelphia Chamber Music Society,

the Seattle Chamber Music Summer Festival, and the Saratoga Chamber Music Festival, on NBC's The Today Show, and with the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center. He has performed with many distinguished ensembles, such as the Juilliard Quartet, the Pacifica Quartet, the Miró Quartet, the Leipzig Quartet, and the Kalichstein-Laredo-Robinson Trio. He has also collaborated with Christoph Eschenbach, André Watts, Emanuel Ax, Jean-Yves Thibaudet, James Ehnes, Gil Shaham, and Kathleen Battle. Mr. Morales is highly sought after for his recitals and master classes, which have taken him throughout North America, Europe and Asia. In addition, he currently serves on the faculty of Temple University.

Mr. Morales's performances have been met with critical acclaim. The Philadelphia Inquirer hailed his appointment to The Philadelphia Orchestra, stating that "... in fact, may represent the most salutary personnel event of the orchestra's last decade." He was praised by the New York Times as having " ... fleet technique, utterly natural musical grace, and the lyricism and breath control of a fine opera singer." Mr. Morales was also singled out in the New York Times review of the Metropolitan Opera's production of Berlioz's Les Troyens, describing his playing as "exquisite" and declaring that he "deserved a place onstage during curtain calls."

Mr. Morales's debut solo recording, French Portraits, is available on the Boston Records label. His recent recordings include performances with the Kalichstein-Laredo-Robinson Trio, with the Pacifica Quartet, which was nominated for a Latin Grammy Award, as well as the Mozart Concerto with the Mito Chamber Orchestra for DECCA. Ricardo is a sought after consultant and designer of musical instruments and accessories, and enjoys a musical partnership with F. Arthur Uebel, a world renowned manufacturer of artist level clarinets.

# Marc Zyla, horn

Marc Zyla is the principal horn of the Quad City Symphony Orchestra, a position he has held since January 2011.

Zyla has been a featured performer in both the QCSO's Masterworks and Signature Series programs including the 2021 program, English Serenade featuring Grammy award winner, Karim Sulayman. Notably, he served as a soloist with the 2009 American Wind Symphony Orchestra, debuting Kaoru Wada's Toone for Horn and Wind Orchestra. In 2019, Zyla made his New York City debut at the International Computer Music Conference,

showcasing Russell Pinkston's Zylamander for horn and Max/MSP.

As a chamber musician, Zyla has collaborated with various ensembles, including the S.A.T.B. Trio, Quad City Symphony Brass Quintet, Illinois Brass Quintet, Pittsburgh Brass Project, and Looking Glass Wind Quintet at the Banff Chamber Music Festival. He is a founding member and featured on the 2021 recording of Alpine Symphony Revisited by the Horns of the Heartland (HOTH) ensemble.

Zyla's experience extends beyond the QCSO; he has served as principal

horn for the Champaign Urbana Symphony Orchestra and the Evansville Philharmonic Orchestra. His portfolio also includes performances with renowned ensembles like Lyric Opera of Chicago, Omaha Symphony Orchestra, Illinois Symphony Orchestra, Grant Park Music Festival Orchestra, West Virginia Symphony, Peoria Symphony, Philhamonie der Nationen (DE), and the Orquesta Filarmonica de Jalisco (MX).

As the Director of Community Engagement at WVIK, Quad Cities NPR Marc hosts a daily drive time classical music program, Allegro Molto and produces a weekly podcast, What's Happenin' QC that highlights the vibrant social scene of the Quad Cities.

Mr. Zyla holds a bachelor's degree in musical arts from West Virginia University, a master's degree in Horn Performance from Carnegie Mellon University, and has completed doctoral coursework in Horn Performance and Literature at the University of Illinois. His mentors include William Caballero, Thomas Jostlein, Bernhard Scully, Robert Lauver, Virginia Thompson, C. Scott Smith, and Luke Zyla. Zyla is a current teaching artist in the QCSO Private Lesson Program (PLP) and has served previously on the faculties of The University of Evansville, St. Ambrose University, and Augustana College. He has also been a guest clinician and teacher at the University of Illinois, Illinois Wesleyan University, Southern Illinois University, and Eastern Illinois University.



Previously he has been a member of the Illinois and Dubuque symphonies. A dedicated teacher, David enjoys teaching in a wide array of settings.

In addition to maintaining a private studio, David can be found presenting bass and coaching sectionals across the midwest. He served as interim bass instructor at University of Wisconsin Madison from 2017-2020. Currently he is a faculty member for both Wisconsin Youth Symphony's Music Makers program and the Madison Conservatory as well as the WYSO sectional coach.

David earned his BM and MM from Indiana University where he studied with Bruce Bransby. Additional training comes from his time as principal bass of the Civic Orchestra of Chicago, Aspen Music Festival, and Alex Hanna.

# Mio Nakamura, piano

Recipient of the Steinway & Sons Top Teacher Award, Mio Nakamura has established herself as an in-demand soloist, collaborative artist, and chamber musician in the Chicago area and abroad. She earned bachelor's and master's degrees in piano performance with honors, as well as a performance diploma, from Roosevelt University's Chicago College of Performing Arts. Her mentors include Mary Sauer, Ludmila Lazar, Mitsuko Uchida, David Schrader, and John W. W. Sherer.

Nakamura's solo appearances include recitals with Chicago's Musicians Club of Women Artists in Recital, Lake View Musical Society Concerts, Fourth Presbyterian Church's Noon Concert Series, and Consulate General of Japan Concerts; on WFMT-FM radio; concerto performances with the Northwest Symphony Orchestra, the Evanston Symphony Orchestra, the Symphony of Oak Park and River Forest, and most recently with the Kyoto New Festival

Orchestra in Japan.

A collaborative enthusiast, Nakamura served as principal piano of the Civic Orchestra of Chicago. In June of 2018, Nakamura performed in the Negaunee Institute's Concert for Peace and at the League of American Orchestras conference with Yo-Yo Ma. She also frequently appears as supplementary keyboardist and rehearsal pianist with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and has performed in Symphony Center, Ravinia, Millennium Park, and Carnegie Hall. Nakamura plays on the CSO's All-Access Chamber Music, MusicNOW, Fourth Presbyterian Church Friday Noon Concert and St. John's Episcopal Church Concert Series.

Currently, Nakamura maintains a private piano studio, performs as organist for St. John's Episcopal Church of Chicago, and is the Artistic Director of Emerging Artists Chicago (www. artchi.org).





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






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

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# THE NATIONAL ANTHEM

While several compositions have the honor of appearing multiple times on more than 100 years of playbills, one piece has the distinction of being performed more often than any other, The Star-Spangled Banner. General Manager Elsie Von Maur instituted the custom of placing it at the beginning of every program immediately after the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941, which coincided with a Sunday performance date. Those in attendance rose to sing the lyrics in patriotic fervor. It immediately became a fixture at all future concerts, accompanied by audience participation with every crisp rendition.

The custom remains today, but it endured a memorable community controversy. It was removed from one

concert in November, 1990. Vocal and written objections from some patrons and members of the public were swift and stinging. The negative reaction was enough to outweigh considerations that the national anthem was distracting to the music and uncomfortable for senior patrons due to the standing factor. While opinions were judged to be about 50-50 on the issue, the intensity of the voices to return to tradition ruled the day. The Star-Spangled Banner resumed its place on the program for the December concert, where it continues to wave over the land of the free and the home of the brave.
