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





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

with community engagement, culminating in critically acclaimed performances of Britten's War Requiem in Europe and America, collaborating with German and American music students, professional musicians and the Nobel Peace Prize Forum. In 2016. he spearheaded the St. Matthew Passion project, again joining German and American students with study and performances on both sides of the Atlantic. Recent projects include appearances with the Joffrey Ballet, conducting Stravinsky's Rite of Spring, as part of a larger exploration of that work, commemorating its 100th anniversary. Formerly Music Director of the Richmond Symphony Orchestra, a position he held from 1999 to 2009, Smith was praised for his innovative and approachable programming and is widely credited with fostering the orchestra's unprecedented artistic growth. He returned to guest conduct the orchestra in 2019.

As a guest conductor, Smith enjoys a burgeoning international reputation that has already brought him engagements and re-engagements with prestigious American orchestras, including the St. Louis Symphony, the Houston Symphony and the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra. With the Minnesota Orchestra, he made his critically acclaimed Sommerfest debut in 2006 and made his subscription series debut in March of 2009, and returns regularly as a guest conductor. An active opera conductor, he has appeared with the Virginia Opera, leading Mozart's The Magic Flute to critical acclaim, among many others. Other recent appearances include

debut performances with the Orquesta Sinfonica de Costa Rica and the Spokane Symphony, and a return to Verizon Hall with the Curtis Orchestra in an all-Wagner program with Eric Owens and Heidi Melton. He regularly returns to his alma mater to lead the Symphony Orchestra of The Curtis Institute of Music, and led the orchestra on tour in China and Korea in the fall of 2011. Smith's debut at the Nomus Music Festival in Novi Sad, Serbia was met with critical and audience acclaim and led to immediate reengagement. Other recent and upcoming appearances include the Santa Barbara Symphony, Brazil's Orquestra Sinfôniea da USP, the Hartford Symphony, Orquesta Sinfonica de Xalapa, the Phoenix Symphony, the Colorado Symphony, the Eugene Symphony, the Curtis Opera Theatre, the Jacksonville Symphony, the Berkshire Choral Festival, the Eastern Music Festival, the Tulsa Philharmonic, Orchestra London (Ontario), and the European Center for Opera and Vocal Art in Ghent, Belgium.

A champion of the music of our time, Smith was the Director of New Music Projects for the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, and developed that orchestra's Engine 408 series, working closely with living composers and adding his unique perspective to enhance that orchestra's great tradition of fostering new works. He again collaborated with Yo-Yo Ma and members of the Chamber Music Society of Minnesota in Hún Qiáo (Bridge of Souls), a concert of remembrance and reconciliation featuring world premieres by Korean, Japanese, Chinese and

American composers. A firm believer in the use of technical innovation to reach world-wide audiences, he debuted in 2002 with the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, conducting the final round of the first Minnesota International Piano-e-Competition, where he led six concerto performances that were streamed live over the Internet. He has led the Minnesota Orchestra in the Competition's final round since 2004 and returns each summer.

Smith grew up in a musical family in Phoenix, Arizona where he began the serious study of conducting while still in his teens. He is a graduate in cello performance of the Juilliard School, where he studied with Claus Adam, and of the Curtis Institute of Music, where he studied conducting with Max Rudolf and Otto-Werner Mueller. While at Curtis, Smith was first prize winner in the National Repertory Orchestra Conductors Competition, and upon graduation, was named Assistant Conductor of the Opera Company of Philadelphia and the Philadelphia Singers, From 1989 to 1994, Smith served as Associate Conductor of the Phoenix Symphony Orchestra and from 1992 through 1999 served as Music Director of the Cheyenne Symphony Orchestra. His dynamic personality, creative programming, and focus on outreach helped revitalize the Springfield (MA) Symphony, where he served as Music Director from 1995 through 2000.

Smith resides in Minneapolis, where his wife, Ellen Dinwiddie Smith, is a horn player with the Minnesota Orchestra. They have two sons, Alexander and Noah.

SYMPHONY DAY

Every year on Symphony Day, over 6,500 fourth and fifth grade students from across the Quad Cities region travel to Davenport's Adler Theatre to experience a live orchestra performance. This event introduces students to the symphony orchestra and classical music through an engaging 45 minutes program performed by the Quad City Symphony Orchestra.

The program is carefully designed to enrich the elementary school general music experience and incorporates fourth and fifth-grade National Core Arts Standards. In advance of the Symphony Day performances, each partnering classroom music teacher is provided a Resource Guide to help familiarize their students with the music they will experience during the concert. This guide contains recordings of the repertoire, as well as information about the music, composers, orchestra, and experience. Additionally, it offers adaptable plans of classroom activities for use by general music teachers.




Season Highlights

- Due to the overwhelming generosity of individuals in our community, we were able to exceed our Annual Fund Campaign goal by 6% to raise \$445,523, increasing the capacity of our concerts and programs to deliver more impact!
- We commissioned and presented the world-premiere of KV265's film accompanying Michael Abels' *Liquify*, also a QCSO commissioned work. Ticket sales for this Masterworks concert, and the following presentation of the Fauré Requiem exceeded ticket sales expectations by over 200%.
- Enrollment in the QCSO's Private Lesson Program grew 77%, from serving 181 students in 2022-23 season to 235 in the 2023-24 season.
- The QCSO received national recognition for its efforts to integrate community engagement with audience development when staff presented at the League of American Orchestras National Conference in Houston in June.
- Our Gala Concert featuring the world renowned concert pianist, Emanuel Ax, was a resounding success, well received by a full house audience, and a significant capstone on the season.
- Quad City Symphony concerts. Being part of the concert club has introduced me to my new favorite pieces, such as Mahler's Symphony No. 1 and helped me connect with other people who would willingly set aside their Saturday evening to listen to amazing classical music. I listen to classical music at home, but I love watching a live orchestra because it immerses me more fully into the music than a recording ever could and inspires me on my own musical journey.







DONOR SPOTLIGHT HOV AND SARA TINSMAN

The Quad City Symphony Orchestra has been a cultural leader in our community for more than 100 years. We simply would not be here without the generous support of those who value the Symphony's impact on the lives of Quad Citizens by making a donation to the QCSO. We are honored and humbled by every gift, as they are reflections of how meaningful the orchestra and music are to so many.

Hovey and Sara Tinsman recently gave a generous contribution to the Quad City Symphony Trust to endow the **Principal Viola Chair** in honor of **Deborah Dakin's** retirement from the orchestra after 35 years as Principal Viola. We are very grateful to Hovey and Sara Tinsman for their gift, and for sharing their story about what the QCSO means to them.

Hovey "Hov" Tinsman grew up regularly attending the Quad City Symphony Orchestra with his family. Once he met Sara, who played in the bass section of the QCSO, he became an avid fan. He and Sara continued the family tradition by bringing their children to performances from an early age and, after Sara retired from the orchestra, the Riverfront Pops concert became a summer highlight for them.

As an area string educator, Sara found the support from the many QCSO education and community engagement programs to be critical in enhancing her students' musical experiences. She remembers the excitement of her students as they dressed up for a night out to the Symphony with their parents

thanks to coveted tickets given through the Victor and Doris Day Foundation. She took great pride in preparing her students for Quad City Symphony Youth Ensemble auditions, and in sharing the enthusiasm with her 4th grade students as they prepared for the annual Symphony Day field trip. Sara also believes the addition and growth of the QCSO lesson programs is a community treasure.

Hovey is now on the Symphony Board of Trustees, and could not be more pleased with the leadership from Mark Russel Smith and Brian Baxter. Together, they bring exciting programming, ever expanding musical excellence, and consistent stability. He is most proud of their leadership during Covid when the QCSO safely provided programming for our community, a great endeavor for our musicians and audience alike. He and Sara said that, "they will never forget



the goosebumps and tears that flowed while attending that first live concert back after Covid. The raw emotion and energy transmitted from the stage is a treasure that can only be experienced live between musicians and the audience, and we will never again take it for granted."

Together, Sara and Hovey happily accompanied the Youth Symphony Orchestra on their maiden European tour to Berlin, Leipzig, and Prague in the summer of 2023. When Hovey's tenure as president of the Board of Trustees came to an end, they were looking for ways to give back to the organization which they say has enhanced their lives immeasurably. They believe it is a happy coincidence that the timing coincided with the retirement of their friend Deborah Dakin.

Deborah has long been admired by

Sara for her love of music, enthusiastic leadership, as well as being a beloved teacher at Augustana College. A former student of Sara's aptly described her experience studying privately with Deb Dakin saying, "her integrity and practice of valuing people over things has influenced our lives beyond the studio and the stage." Daniela Rybarczyk, also a former student and Youth Ensembles alumna, says, "she was an amazing teacher and I grew so much as a musician. She is passionate, cares deeply about her students, and pushes you to be a better person every day. I learned to think about and approach music with a purpose."

After receiving his BM degree at the Eastman School of Music and MM degree at Yale University, he received his DMA at the University of Michigan. 

A. Pavan, tabla



Dr. Pavan is a regular figure in the Twin Cities music circles as a *Tabla* player and teacher. He initially trained in *Tabla* under Sri G. Laxmiah, senior disciple of Ustad Shaik Dawood Khan of Hyderabad, India. He has studied with several masters over the years and presently trains with Ustad Shabbir Nisar, the illustrious son and disciple of the Tabla legend Ustad Shaik Dawood Khan. He

has performed for Katha Dance Theater, Pangea World Theater and Indian Music Society of Minnesota (IMSOM) in several productions and concerts. Pavan also appears on recordings of world/fusion music with many MN based artists. Since 1999 Pavan has been providing Tabla instruction to a number of students. Pavan co-composed and performed with Nirmala Rajasekar, Minnesota based Veena artist, the score for Pangea World Theater's production "Partitions", and the score for "5 Weeks" with Dr. Pooja Goswami Pavan, his wife, who is a Hindustani vocalist, teacher and composer. Pavan has also performed with the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra along with Nirmala Rajasekar. In 2024, Pavan received a commission from the Greater Twin Cities Youth Symphonies (GTCYS) and was a featured Tabla soloist in their Spring Festival concerts. His creative projects have been supported by grants from the Metropolitan Regional Arts Council (MRAC) and the Minnesota State Arts Board (MSAB).

A senior leader in technology innovation and management, Pavan is an alumnus of the University of Minnesota from where he received his Ph.D. His association with the IMSOM goes back to 1989 when he first arrived in MN. He has served in IMSOM in various capacities, first as a volunteer, then playing various roles as a member of the Executive Committee for several years and finally as President of the Society from 1997 - 2001. He continues to be very active in IMSOM and presently serves as a member of the Advisory Board. Dr. Pavan was the Executive Director for several of IMSOM's big concert productions in the past including "Masters of Percussion" (2002 and 2006), "Legends of India" (2003), "Remember Shakti" (2003) and "Rhythm Fantasies of India" (2004) and "Zakir Hussain with Niladri Kumar" (2022). Dr. Pavan leads the grant writing responsibilities for IMSOM and has won well over 100 grants for the society under his leadership for artistic projects, capital improvements, management consultancy and arts learning.

Shelley Cooper, narrator and soprano

Shelley Cooper is an Off Broadway Award Winning Solo Actor/Playwright, Associate Professor of Musical Theatre at Augustana College and is no stranger to the Quad City Symphony Orchestra. Cooper was featured as the "Narrator" in A Soldiers Tale (2021) and stage director for Karkinos and Two Remain (2022).

Her one woman show, La Divina: The Last Interview of Maria Callas was featured in Solofest, LA Women's Theatre Festival, Hollywood Fringe (Pick of the Fringe), Orlando Fringe (Best Individual Performance in a Drama) and Off-Broadway at United Solofest on Theatre Row (Best One Woman Show). Her newest work Jenny Lind Presents P.T. Active as a guest conductor and clinician throughout the United States and abroad, he has served in this capacity in All State, State, and Regional festivals of the American Choral Directors Association, the



Ms. Lyon's notable repertoire premieres include *Our Will to Live*

(2022), presented as part of Out of Darkness: Holocaust Messages for today; The Soldier's Tale and Benny's Gig with Quad City Symphony Orchestra (2021); Dumbarton Oaks with Orchestra Iowa (2020); and several celebrated collaborations with the Figge Art Museum: "Sporting Fashion: Outdoor Girls 1800-1960" (2023), "For America" (2021), Paris en Pointe, which premiered in conjunction with the Figge Art Museum's "French Moderns: Monet to Matisse, 1850-1950," Glassworks (2019), inspired by "Louis Comfort Tiffany: Treasures from the Dreihaus Collection," and "The Dark Fiddler" (2016).

Ms. Lyon's Dance "Four" Piano (2018), commissioned by Orchestra Iowa, was performed alongside Grammy-winning pianist Emanuel Ax at the Golden Key Gala in Cedar Rapids, IA. Her mesmerizing and hypnotic Bolero, set to Ravel's piano arrangement for four hands, was invited to close the 2015 Crème de La Crème at the Gallagher Bluedorn Performing Arts Center and has subsequently become a perennial audience favorite. Her The Nutcracker received the 2014 Argpatch award for Best Live Action in Entertainment.

Ms. Lyon has created curriculum and content for BQC's community outreach programs including *The*

Ugly Duckling: A Message of Acceptance Told Through Dance, Dance Me a Story: Exploring Literature Through Ballet, The Nutcracker, and the DREAMS program. As a principal faculty member of BQC School of Dance, she has created and implemented a comprehensive syllabus for beginning through preprofessional ballet students. To support her teaching of classical ballet technique, Ms. Lyon has completed two pedagogy courses centered on the years 1-5 of the Vaganova syllabus with John White, an authority of the Vaganova teaching method and former dancer and Ballet master of the National Ballet of Cuba, as well as intensive training exploring the biomechanics of movement with the late physicist Kenneth Laws and master coach Arleen Sugano. She attended Central Pennsylvania Youth Ballet's Teacher Intensive workshop with Marcia Dale Weary and participated repeatedly as a choreographer at the Glenda Brown Choreography Project.

She is a requested keynote speaker for civic groups throughout the Quad Cities area, has been a guest speaker on several local arts related radio programs and podcasts, and has been invited to sit on area grant panels. Ms. Lyon is a recipient of an lowa Arts & Cultural Emergency Relief Grant for an individual artist.

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Naha Greenholtz, violin

Canadian violinist Naha Greenholtz was born in Kyoto, Japan, where she began her violin studies at age three. Since her solo debut at 14, concerto performances have included engagements with the San Francisco Ballet, National Ballet of Canada, and National Repertory Orchestras, as well as the Vancouver, Quad City, Burnaby, and Kelowna Symphonies. In the Madison area she makes regular solo appearances with the Madison Symphony and the Middleton Community Orchestra.

Naha also maintains an active career as an orchestra musician. In addition to her duties as Concertmaster of both the Madison and Quad City Symphony Orchestras, past performance highlights include guest concertmaster appearances with the Oregon, Omaha, and Memphis Symphonies, the San Francisco Ballet, as well as the Calgary and Louisiana Philharmonics, among many others.

In recent seasons she has served as guest concertmaster with the Chicago Philharmonic (in collaboration with the English National Ballet) and made her Australian debut in a concertmaster residency with the Australian Ballet in Melbourne. From 2011-2014 she maintained a partnership with the National Ballet of Canada in Toronto, performing and touring frequently with the company as guest concertmaster and soloist. Additionally she has performed often with the Cleveland Orchestra both domestically and abroad. She began her career in 2007-2008 with the Louisiana Philharmonic and later with the Milwaukee Symphony.

Naha has participated in music festivals throughout the US and Europe including Kneisel Hall (Maine), Taos (New Mexico), Spoleto (Italy), Lucerne (Switzerland), Bach Dancing and Dynamite Society (Wisconsin), and the New York String



Orchestra Seminar at Carnegie Hall. She is currently on artist faculty at Renova Music Festival (Newcastle, Pennsylvania) and since 2012 has been Artistic Director of QCSO's Signature/Up Close Series.

Naha studied with Donald Weilerstein and Joel Smirnoff at Juilliard and with William Preucil at CIM. Other teachers have included Andy Dawes, Akira Nagai, and Judith Ingolfsson. She performs on a 1778 Antonio Gragnani violin.







THE NATIONAL ANTHEM

While several compositions have the honor of appearing multiple times on more than 100 years of playbills, one piece has the distinction of being performed more often than any other, *The Star-Spangled Banner*. General Manager Elsie Von Maur instituted the custom of placing it at the beginning of every program immediately after the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941, which coincided with a Sunday performance date. Those in attendance rose to sing the lyrics in patriotic fervor. It immediately became a fixture at all future concerts, accompanied by audience participation with every crisp rendition.

The custom remains today, but it endured a memorable community controversy. It was removed from one

concert in November, 1990. Vocal and written objections from some patrons and members of the public were swift and stinging. The negative reaction was enough to outweigh considerations that the national anthem was distracting to the music and uncomfortable for senior patrons due to the standing factor. While opinions were judged to be about 50-50 on the issue, the intensity of the voices to return to tradition ruled the day. The Star-Spangled Banner resumed its place on the program for the December concert, where it continues to wave over the land of the free and the home of the brave.

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
