BEFORE the CONCERT



Arrive 20-30 minutes before the start so you have time to find your seat and get comfortable.



Come as you are! You may see some

people in evening dresses and others in jeans and a t-shirt. There is no dress code.



Try sitting in different spots each time you attend a concert to find the best spot for you to enjoy the music.



Take a quick selfie.

FIRST TIMER'S GUIDE



DURING *the* **CONCERT**



If you arrive late, wait until a piece ends before entering the hall. Ushers can help you figure out the best time to enter, and prevent you from distracting performers and audience members during the performance.



If you are unsure when to clap, it's always safe to assume that a piece is complete when the conductor puts down their arms and faces the audience.



Phones must be silenced.



Pictures may be taken if there is no flash and the screen is dimmed for night mode. We don't want to disturb others or take away from their experience.



Some performances will have short intermissions. This is a great time to stand, stretch, or even make a trip to the restroom. Be quick because time goes fast.







WOLFGANG AMADEUS MOZART

Mozart is one of the most recognizable composers of all time. He is known for being a child prodigy who was playing harpsichord at age three and composing his first concerto at the age of five. When he was seven, his father took his family on the road so that Mozart and his sister could perform. They traveled all over Europe. Mozart began writing operas and completed his first before he was a teenager. The word overture is French for "opening." The overture is the piece that is played before a ballet or opera and can be performed as a stand alone piece. This is the introduction piece to Mozart's opera The Magic Flute. The piece opens with three chords that return in the middle of the piece as a sort of ode to his Masonic membership. The overture is a fugue which means a main melody is introduced and then played by other sections. You will hear the main melody layered through many sections of the orchestra and restated in different ways. Try to see if you can catch when it moves through the different sections.







RUTH GIPPS

Royal College of Music & Durham University

Ruth Gipps was an English female composer who was not accepted the way that her male peers were as was commonly referred to as a "housewife composer." Not only was she a composer with over 70 works, but she was an accomplished oboist, conductor and teacher. She started playing piano as a child and entered the Royal College of Music to study music as a teenager. Gipps composed symphonies and concertos and in 1955 she founded the London Repertoire Orchestra. She ran the orchestra for over 30 years while also teaching at places such as Trinity College of Music, Royal College of Music and Kingston Polytechnic. It makes sense that Gipps would write works for oboe like this concerto because she was an oboe player herself. This piece is technically difficult for an oboist which requires them to be accurate, fast, and play in an extended range. There are contrasting sections that feature different tones of the instrument and a cadenza that allows the performer to show off. This piece has a pastoral melody, or one that makes a person think of rural life. In this case, it would be the English countryside.



ANTON BRUCKNER

Josef Anton Bruckner was an Austrian composer who was not considered successful until he was in his 60s. Some of this may have come from the fact that he was a huge fan of Richard Wagner at a time when people were making comparisons between Wagner and Johannes Brahms. He was very religious and believed that his gift of composition was something that he had to share and would not change because of the criticism of others. Bruckner was a choir boy in the St. Florian monastery-school. Although he played violin by four and was playing organ by ten, Bruckner became an elementary school teacher. He taught for about a decade at St. Florian. He left to pursue his musical career.


Image: Mozart in 1767, at approximately 11 years old.



Symphony No. 7 is just over an hour in length. The first movement opens with the strings and is a slow-moving build to the intense climax at the end of the first movement. Bruckner wrote the Adagio (the second movement) as an elegy, a piece that expresses sorrow for someone who died, to Wagner. It opens with a quartet of

tubas and again the strings steadily build to enormous climaxes before ending quietly. The third movement is a scherzo which is typically fast. The strings play an ostinato, or repeated background figure, while the trumpet presents the main melodic idea. This melody gets passed around in different sections. The trumpet keeps lead as other instruments respond. The brass trade off strong statements of the first melody with more lyrical sections in the strings and woodwinds. After closing the third movement so powerfully, the finale begins sweetly and just like the other movements builds momentum. Bruckner brings back the first theme in the symphony before closing the piece.



The piano became popular in the 18th century. The instrument has changed to have a variety of shapes and sizes. These include the grand, baby grand, upright and

electronic versions. The piano has 88 black and white keys. The black keys are set in groups of two or three. The piano has such a large range that the notes are represented on the grand staff, which has the treble and bass clefs. Many people recognize pianos immediately because they are used in so many types of music. It is also an instrument that people typically accompany themselves on. People argue about which traditional orchestral family of instruments the piano belongs to. Some say it's in the string family because the sound comes from vibrating strings and some say the percussion family because a hammer strikes the strings. You will also see that the piano is considered part of the keyboard family. What do you think it should be?


