Welcome back to another Masterworks! Midsummer Night's Dream. Blended cultural sounds are sandwiched between works that were inspired by William Shakespeare.

We start the evening with David Diamond's Music for Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet. This piece was not written to accompany Shakespeare's dramatic work, but instead should help you experience the mood of the story. I bet if you close your eyes you can imagine Romeo speaking to his love from below her balcony.

The sound shifts when the orchestra performs two pieces by Reena Esmail. This Indian American composer is blazing a trail for composers that want to blend music from their own identity or heritage with that of Western classical music. In Testament, Esmail uses traditional Hindustani raags and parts for a tabla, to showcase some well known aspects of Indian classical music. In RE | Member, Esmail takes us back to just a short time ago when our world was unsure of how we would move forward after a pandemic, let alone gather for music performances. She reminds us to come together and not to forget our experiences when we were apart.

The performance closes with more music that showcases the work of Shakespeare. Unlike Diamond's piece, A Midsummer Night's Dream, by Felix Mendelssohn, was written as music that would go along with the stage play. Love, mischief and magic exist in the energy and expression of each movement.



If you arrive late, wait until a piece ends before entering the hall. Ushers can help you figure out the best time to enter, and prevent you from distracting performers and audience members during the performance.



If you are unsure when to clap, it's always safe to assume that a piece is complete when the conductor puts down their arms and faces the audience.



Phones must be silenced.



Pictures may be taken if there is no flash and the screen is dimmed for night mode. We don't want to disturb others or take away from their experience.



Some performances will have short intermissions. This is a great time to stand, stretch, or even make a trip to the restroom. Be quick because time goes fast.

She has studied with Larry Shapiro, Cornelius Chiu, and Bruce Molsky (old time fiddle) and has participated in masterclasses by Brooklyn Rider, Eroica Trio, Ralph Fielding, Katie Lansdale, and Gerhard Schulz. Additionally, she has studied viola under Richard Auldon Clark and cello under Dr. William Grubb. Kim previously served as Assistant Concertmaster of the Fox Valley Orchestra and has taught chamber music as a teacher assistant at Interlochen Arts Camp.

WHY DID YOU CHOOSE YOUR CURRENT MUSICAL CAREER?

I have always loved music and wanted to share this love with others. I originally wanted to become an orchestra teacher but decided to focus on violin halfway through college. I found a way to both perform and teach with my current jobs within the symphony!



DAVID DIAMOND

Eastman School of Music, music theory & violin New Music School

David Diamond is an American composer who was playing violin and writing music using his own notation by the age of 7. He received training from teachers at different conservatory schools until he went on scholarship to the New Music School in 1934. Diamond, like some other American composers, studied in Paris under Nadia Boulanger at Fontainebleau. Diamond won a Juilliard Publication Award for his piece Psalm, written for fourhand piano, was a Fulbright professor at the University of Rome, and won a Guggenheim Fellowship to go back to Paris to study some more. Later, he became a professor at The Juilliard School. Diamond's parents immigrated from what is now Ukraine and spoke Yiddish. Diamond wrote pieces to be used during services in a Jewish temple. He continued to use Judaically related works in other compositions. Diamond's Music for Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet was not composed as music for the play. It was created as a stand alone five-movement concert suite with the goal of showcasing the mood of key parts of the play. This symphony is cyclical, meaning that the composer will reintroduce material like a melody or theme and different points in the piece. This creates a sense of unity that makes each movement feel connected to the other. See if you can listen for the themes that Diamond brought back throughout the piece.

REENA ESMAIL



The Juilliard School, Bachelor of Music Yale School of Music, Master of Music, Master of Musical Art, & Doctorate of Musical Arts

Reena Esmail is an Indian-American composer who brings aspects of Indian music and Western classical music together. Esmail has written orchestral, chamber, and choral music. She is the Los Angeles Master Chorale's Artist in Residence and the artistic director of Shastra. Shastra is an organization that promotes the cross-cultural connection of musical traditions between India and the West. Esmail has been studying and working with Hindustani vocalist Saili Oak since 2014.



RE | Member

RE | Member was composed as a piece that would have opened the 2020 concert season, but due to the COVID-19 pandemic, coming back to perform as usual was not going to happen. The piece represents two meanings of the word remember. First, to bring something back together and second, to not forget. The members of orchestras came back together after different experiences may have changed how they do life and these perspectives should not be forgotten. Esmail looked to Mozart's The Marriage of Figaro and Bernstein's Candide as a guide to create a piece that felt like an overture. Again, the piece opens with solo oboe. Originally, the soloist is supposed to appear on video in the beginning and then when the solo appears again at the end, that same oboist would play a duet with themselves on the recording. It might remind you of taking a class online or watching different musicians create music by layering different videos of themselves together. Another way to do this is to put the oboist in a balcony away from the orchestra. Make sure you pay attention to see how the Quad City Symphony Orchestra decides to perform the piece.



Testament

Testament is the third movement of Vishwas. According to the composer, "The word vishwas (विशवास) expresses the concept of fervent belief, or faith, in Hindi." It opens with soft strings and solo oboe using melodic information from traditional Hindustani raags. Raags are melodic scales that are used to express a feeling and there are over a thousand different raags. It quickly transitions layering in more instrument sections. The orchestra is joined by a special instrument, the tabla. The tabla is a traditional instrument from North India. Those that learn to play the tabla learn through oral tradition, not by reading notation on sheet music.



FELIX MENDELSSOHN

Felix Mendelssohn was a German composer born to Jewish parents who converted to Christianity as a marker of their upward movement in society. The Mendelssohns were baptized Lutheran. The children received lessons in literature, painting, and music. Felix studied piano and traveled to Paris to continue his learning. He made his first public appearance in 1818. He was nine years old! He began composing at a young age, but he gained more notoriety as a composer with the Overture to A Midsummer Night's Dream. Many of Mendelssohn's works are believed to have been lost during World War II which included operas, symphonies, concerti, sonatas, fugues, oratorios, and works for organ. He traveled all over Europe gaining inspiration for his various works becoming one of Queen Victoria's favorite composers. Mendelssohn composed A Midsummer's Night Dream as incidental music for **Shakespeare's comedy**. Incidental music is written to accompany or reflect the mood or action of a dramatic on stage performance. It usually is not played on its own because the action on-stage is meant to stand out. However, Mendelssohn's work has been able to stand alone. Set in ancient Greece, the play takes place in the woods near Athens. The daughter of a duke refuses to marry someone her father has promised her to and runs away with the man she loves, accompanied by a friend and the man she was promised to. In another part of the woods, the king and queen of the fairies are in an argument and send one of their own to find a magic plant to cast a spell. Some fairy magic and a mix up makes the situation between the Athenian runaways worse. You'll have to check it out for yourself to find out what happens.

INSTRUMENT SPOTLIGHT

BASSOON



The bassoon is the largest of the woodwind instruments typically found in the orchestra. Like the oboe, the bassoon is a double reed instrument. This means that two reeds are tied together so that they vibrate. There is no mouthpiece. The reed is attached to the bocal which is a metal tube. The four remaining pieces of the instrument are called joints. Many consider the instrument difficult to play because of the finger combinations which help produce the tone quality that is unique to the bassoon. The bassoon was developed during the 1600s. Throughout the years, the instrument has changed and been improved with the addition of keys. Carl Almenräder and Johann Adam Heckel worked to perfect the German bassoon. The German bassoon is now the standard everywhere except France, Italy, and Spain.






